


**FOR STUDENTS: Accessing a Quiz Submission View**

When an instructor has enabled a submission view for students, the following documentation will show students how to access their submitted quiz.


**INSTRUCTIONS:**

**STEP 1:** Under Assessment, select **User Progress**. Under Summary, (located on the left of the page) select Quizzes.
